Case-based discussion will focus on the intraoperative management of the unexpected obstetric haemorrhage including a multidisciplinary team approach to resuscitation, the use of ROTEM to guide blood product therapy and blood conservation techniques.

Audit workshop – Pre-operative Management of Diabetic Patients: Are We Doing Best Practice?

Around 10-15% of surgical population are diabetic. This includes Type 1, Type 2 and Gestational Diabetes. Optimization of their glycaemic control and management of their medications are important aspects of the perioperative care to minimise complications. Newer drugs like SGLT2 inhibitors are known cause of euglycaemic acidosis in patients who are fasting for surgery. The objective of this audit is to ascertain if we are doing the best practice for our diabetic patients preoperatively.

This workshop will involve participants collecting data in a questionnaire format on 30-50 of their own surgical patients who are diabetic, prior to surgery. Data will be collectively analysed by the workshop facilitators with an opportunity for participants to consider how audit data can be analysed. The results will be discussed during the ASM workshop session. In order to obtain the full 20 credits required for an Audit in the Practice Evaluation category of CPD participants will have to complete the data collection during the specified time frame AND attend the workshop session.

Registration for this workshop will close on 10 January 2022 to allow sufficient time for participants to collect audit data. Participants will receive all relevant information required to collect the data, with a REDCap project being set up to facilitate. Participants will have 10 weeks to complete the process. Data will be submitted to workshop facilitator via the REDCap project. Alternative formats will be made available (structured Excel form) but are not encouraged.

Participants who do not complete the data collection may still attend the ASM workshop session and receive 2 credits per hour under “Report of Clinical Audit Findings”.

Participants are highly encouraged to obtain individual hospital’s governance approval prior to commencing the audit. This project has WA Health Governance approval (GEKO number 42790) to proceed. It is participant’s responsibility to find out what their local regulation is as patient de-identified data will be assessed outside that hospital. Please note that it is not mandatory to have ethics approval to satisfy CPD activity requirement.
